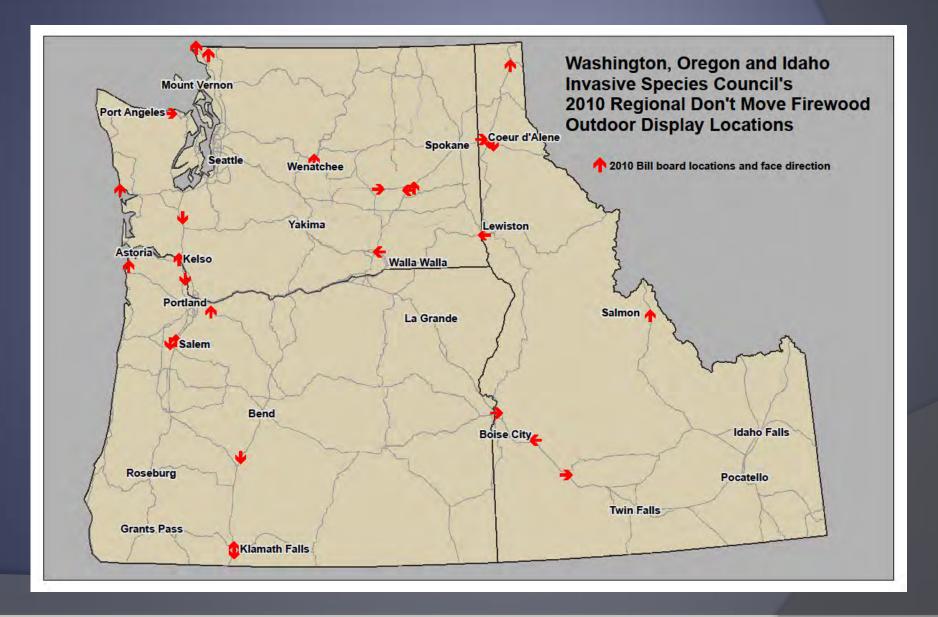

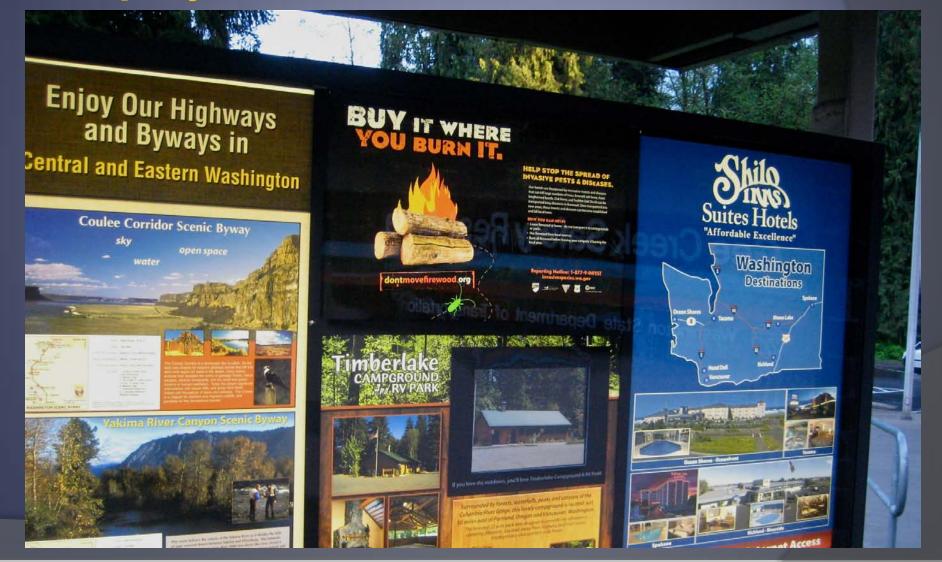

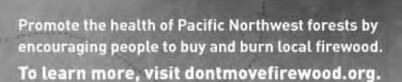


Live and dead trees can have damaging pest infestations. As a firewood cutter, you can help protect trees-and your businessby minimizing the distance that firewood gets moved.

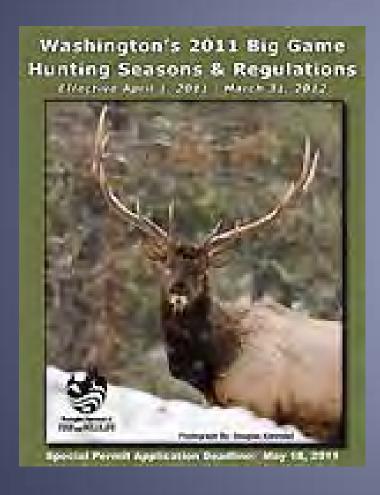
- Invasive insects and diseases threaten the health of Pacific Northwest forests.

- You can make a difference by cutting and selling your firewood locally.

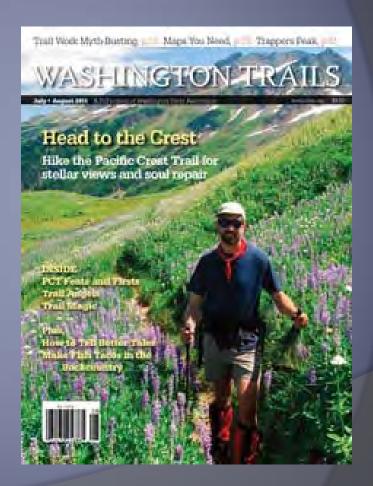
How you can help:

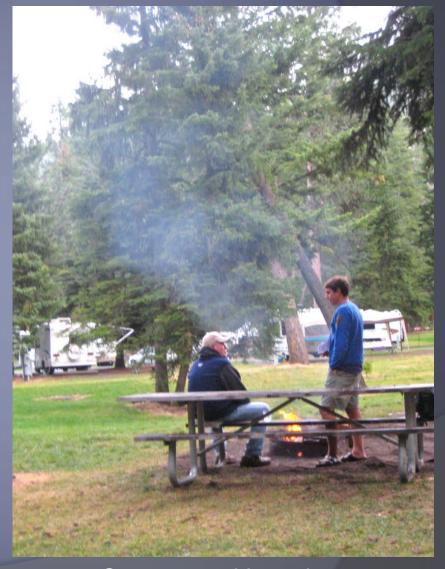

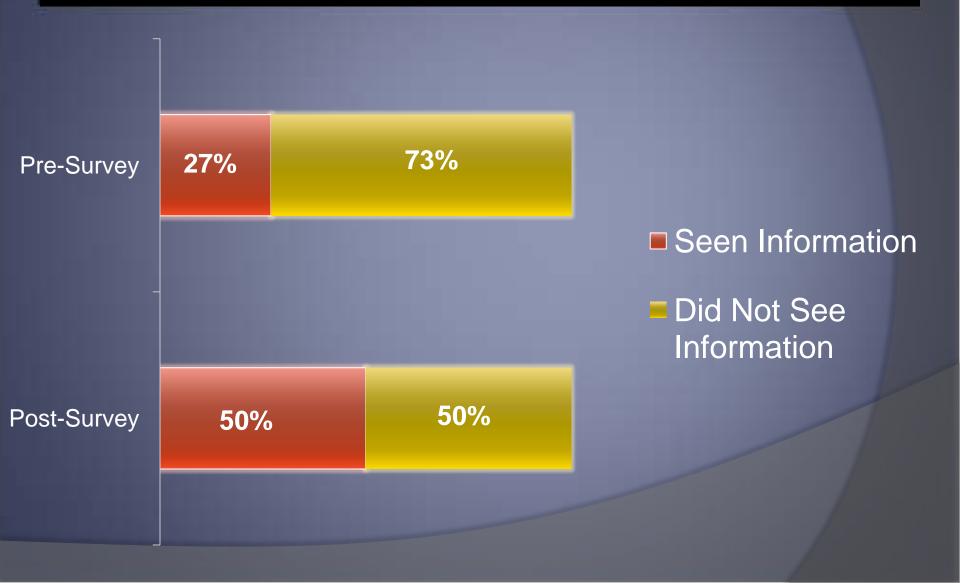

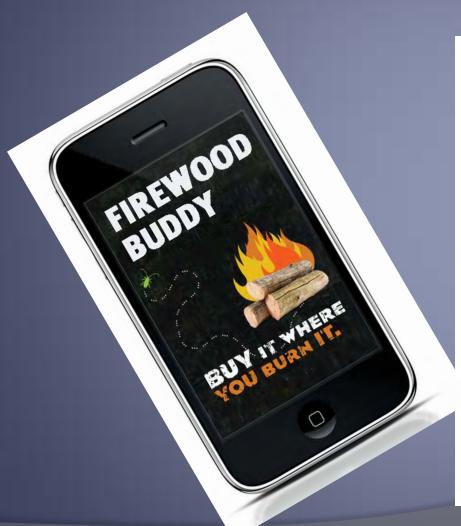
Was the 2010 tri-state firewood campaign effective in exposing campers to information about the threat of invasive species moving through firewood?

Lessons Learned

- Effectiveness is enhanced with:
 - Council structure allows for regional collaboration
 - Dedicated funding for mutually agreed upon specific project outcomes
 - People/entities with outreach skill sets (e.g., marketing company)
 - Focus on the messages and outcomes versus promoting individual agencies
- Campaign is a successful example of leveraging funds to make progress through partnerships
- Campaign can 'live on' in other places without reinventing materials.
