The group had sufficient time to discuss the rationale behind these priorities. The group also discussed some other invasive species priorities and concerns that had not been included in the respective Transition packages.

Both the Dialogue and NECIS expect to present their priorities to the Congress in January. The participants agreed the next opportunity to interact with Obama Administration officials on invasive species will probably be confirmation hearings for the new Secretary and Under Secretary of Agriculture.
